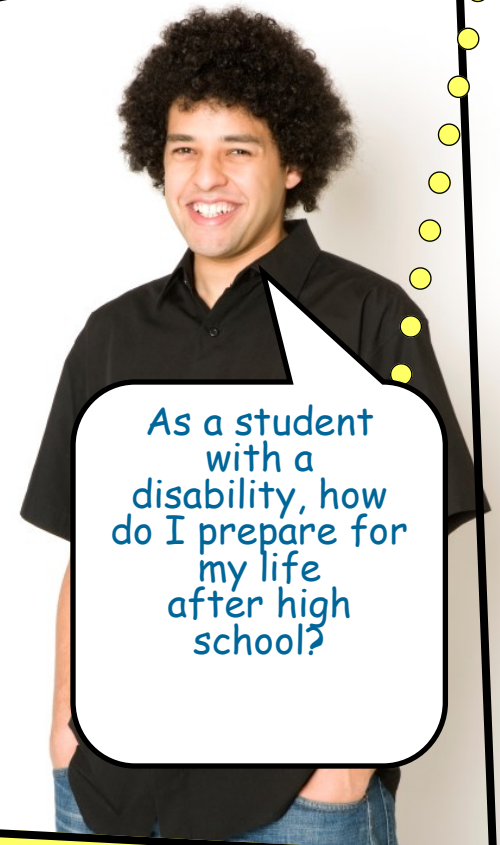

## Services and Supports

Services or supports that a person may need to promote independence and life skills in the community.

### Options for publically funded services

**FAMILY CARE** provides assistance with coordination of services and uses personal Medicare or Medicaid card to pay doctor and prescription drugs.

**PARTNERSHIP** (where available) provides a full range of services that includes all health, medical services, and prescription

**MEDICAID (Title 19) “FORWARD” CARD**, used for doctor’s visits and other health services.

**IRIS** helps you self-direct all services and uses personal Medicaid and/or Medicare.
